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Promising news on the delivery of fibre broadband to Broughton and surrounding areas...... Many more of us will have access to fibre by the end of 2026

A Bit of Background

Many of you will remember the B4RN project that myself and a number of local volunteer coordinators worked on a few years ago. Unfortunately this was unable to progress for reasons beyond our control. This left a lot of us still abandoned and still very poorly served with broadband, particularly in the outlying areas of Broughton.

The Plan - "Hyperfast GB"

The Government has remained committed to provide gigabyte capable broadband to the hard-to-reach properties of Cumbria like us. The current project involves Government investment together with considerable investment in network build costs by a company called Fibrus.

Fibrus has been selected to deliver a contract for Cumbria to bring next generation broadband services to up to 60,000 homes and businesses that might have otherwise missed out on gigabit upgrades. They are working in conjunction with *Viberoptix* who are responsible for the surveying and upgrading of the existing network in order to deliver fibre. You will probably have seen many of their vans working around our area in recent months.

What this means for us

Many of us in the Broughton area are included within this figure of 60,000.

Sadly, we can't say all, but we're told it will be the vast majority. It might not be the perfect solution but is considerably better than anything we have been offered before and certainly includes more homes than ever committed to by the likes of BT Openreach.

What's next?

Frustratingly, even the Fibrus Ambassadors don't even know the exact timescales but the contract ends in 2026 and they have said they have to deliver by then. They are currently actively working in other areas of Cumbria and they say they will get to us.

Look out for a residents' meeting – Fibrus will be planning an information meeting, hopefully in the coming months so watch this space......

I am acting as a Hub Co-ordinator for Fibrus to help facilitate the process at a local level. This means I will endeavour to keep us all informed about the project and also provide the benefit of local knowledge to Fibrus as the works progress. Contact me if you want more information or further detail about the inclusion of your property in the project. I will help where I can, or certainly point you in the right direction.

Parish Council Drop In, The Square Café, 12th March 2024 10.45 — 12noon

Firstly, on behalf of the community, Duddon Parish Council would like to thank Phil White for donating the Christmas tree, and everyone who came out to help put it up and take it down. Community spirit at its best!

Help Wanted

Whilst the 10 Parish Councillors give their time for free, they can't do everything. We are always looking for people to help with a range of projects and now is no exception. So, if you have a few hours to spare, the following positions need to be filled:

- 1. Community Resilience Plan. A coordinator is required for this important role as well as team members.
- 2. <u>CGP Trust</u>, <u>Brown Cow Institute and Garner Grave Charity</u>. A new Clerk is needed for the CGP Trust to replace Rosie Robinson who is stepping down in June this year. The Brown Cow Institute and Garner Grave Charity generate a relatively small, but significant, amount which is available to the community in much the same way as the CGP Trust is. These could ideally be handled in conjunction with the CGP Trust. This is not a paid position, but a small honorarium is paid each year.
- 3. <u>Place Plan</u>. This will replace the Broughton Community Plan which is ready to be updated to anticipate the services and responsibilities that Westmorland & Furness Council may devolve to local councils in the future. By knowing the community's "wish-list" we will be better placed to know what you want, budget for it, and hopefully deliver it. This Plan will form the basis of future projects which will help improve quality of services, recreational facilities and life in general. To that end, we need someone to coordinate this important aspect of the community's "voice".
- 4. <u>Public Conveniences</u>. A cleaner is required for the public toilets <u>from April, 3</u> times a week for 1 hour per day. This will be a negotiated paid contract, but you should be self-employed and have your own insurance.

Victory Hall

Work is ongoing to make the Victory Hall an even better community asset. We have already had an extensive audit of the building which has highlighted a number of areas that need repair/improvement. We will aim to work our way through these with minimal impact to the users where possible. In addition to these larger jobs, we are looking for a Victory Hall handy-person to carry out basic repairs, general maintenance and other smaller DIY tasks. If anyone is interested please contact Christine Adams at info@duddonparishcouncil.org.uk. You may also remember that there was a major water leak before Christmas. As well as the cost of the repair itself, we then received a water bill of almost £12,000!

One area that has seen a dramatic change is the booking system. We are delighted to announce that the Hall can now also be booked online. Please go to the Victory Hall website at https://www.victoryhallbroughton.co.uk and follow the links. You will be able to see a "live" calendar of the availability of the rooms. Once you have selected the venue, date and time you will be prompted to read and acknowledge the Terms & Conditions and Privacy Policy.

Traffic and Road Safety

We can report that Westmorland & Furness Highways has finally responded to the issues and concerns we raised with them some eight months ago. There are a couple of minor works scheduled, but there was no mention of the alternate traffic flow options, or much-needed traffic calming measures which were mooted at the meeting last May. There was also no mention of the joint Parish Council/Broughton School questionnaire about the safety and effectiveness of the Kepplewray buildout. However, we were informed that Highways had conducted an audit of the current 20MPH zone and recommendations have been made for discussion at Council-level Locality Team meetings. We have expressed disappointment and concern at the disregard for community involvement or engagement. We await a response to these concerns. Mr Simon Fell MP has asked to be kept in the loop on the issues we have highlighted to Highways and will add his weight to seek resolutions. Nevertheless, this was never going to be a quick fix, as many of you will have realised by now, so patience is the name of the game.

Council Tax

And finally, let's talk money! The new financial year is almost upon us, so along with Westmorland & Furness Council, the Police and Fire authorities, Duddon Parish Council must decide on how much money it needs to raise in Council Tax. This is called "the Precept". The current precept is £32,700 per year, spread across all Council Tax properties in the parish. Despite the rising costs and inflation that we are all experiencing, the Parish Council has decided that through prudent use of reserves, bearing down on expenditure and maximising income we are not proposing to increase this figure — a 0% change on last year. Of course the bulk of each Council Tax Bill goes towards Westmorland & Furness Council, Police and Fire who make their own decisions on their requirements.



Forest bathing (or forest therapy) is a slow, gentle, guided walk in nature. It isn't a naturalist exploration and it isn't a rigorous hike. a guided tour of the school, after which we presented small prizes, explained the current projects being undertaken by Sustainable Duddon, and engaged the children in a short Q & A session. All entrants received a tree, courtesy of the Woodland Trust, to plant and nurture. Our School is very supportive of environmental education, and it is good to know that the children are being so well taught about nature and their environment.

Apple Grafting Course

At the time of writing, the course is over a week away, and is almost full. We hope all who attended found it enjoyable and informative. Thanks to Dick Palmer for his time and expertise.

Environmental Improvements at Thwaites School

Sustainable Duddon works closely with Millom Without

Environment Group. They have been working with head teacher of Thwaites School, Mr Redhead, to deliver environmental benefits to the pupils and everyone at Thwaites school.

More hedges have been planted, some of which were sourced by us, and native wildflower bulbs



ordered. Additional grants will pay for other improvements including hedge laying, gravel for paths, and a wildlife camera, which is currently being trialled.

Trees

We have managed to source over 700 trees which will be used for a variety of projects together with other environmental groups in our area. These have been "heeled in" in the Community Garden ready for transplanting to their final locations.

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MESSAGE FROM OUR MP SIMON FELL

In my last article I mentioned the delays to the scheme at Grizebeck due to the pandemic and the impact

that this has had on costs and delivery since then. You may recall that in 2020 I secured £12.7 million from the Department of Transport to get the bypass over the line, but now the cost of the project has ballooned and the Council requires more funding to get it delivered. Recently I brought the roads Minister to Dove Ford to see just why it is so necessary, and only a couple of weeks ago, I took the Leader of the Council to see the Cabinet Secretary in his office in Whitehall to make the case as part of Team Barrow. The work continues and I'm hoping for a breakthrough soon as this delay is unfair on everyone involved, keeps the road unsafe, and holds our area back.

As always, Team Barrow has kept me very busy. This opportunity to leverage the generations of work now secured in the shipyard thanks to the Government's commitment to Dreadnought and AUKUS to drive significant investment into the area is huge.

One such example came last month when Homes England approved a £24.8 million funding agreement to deliver the Marina Village in Barrow, enabling the creation of over 800 new homes. The funding comes as part of the Team Barrow programme of work, bringing together the Government (led by the Cabinet Secretary), Westmorland & Furness Council, BAE, and myself, to ensure that Furness is in the best position to deliver the submarine programme and against AUKUS. and that the wider Furness peninsula benefits from that multi-decade programme of work. Marina Village will provide 808 new homes, a nature conservation area and new public open spaces. It is vital to the plan to secure Furness's future. There's plenty more work to do in Team Barrow, but this announcement is an important marker in delivering for Furness.

I also recently joined a meeting of local farmers, and our local National Farmers Union team, kindly hosted by Tom Postlethwaite at his home in Urswick. As ever there was lots to discuss, and we covered a range of issues from water management to TB and protecting and sustaining rural communities to planning. There was lots for me to take away and discuss with the Ministerial team in Westminster, and to raise locally too. But as ever, I'm left with a deep appreciation for Furness's farmers, who produce some really wonderful food, protect our landscapes, keep our rural communities alive, and do a whole lot more alongside that too.

Parish News



Benefices of Broughton and Duddon & Kirkby Ireleth. Associate Priest of the Parish of Thwaites

I wonder what is blooming in your garden or in the scenery surrounding where you live? At present my garden is full of snowdrops, crocuses, and daffodils flowering. Whilst serving as youth minister at Ulverston Parish Church, I remember we led youth group sessions outdoors. At the end of March, we went into the woods and spent time noticing the leaves, the seeds, the dead spring flowers, and how little colour there was. We went back to the same woods in early May and the floor was covered in bluebells. It was magnificent and an experience that I will never forget. Spring is a season that speaks of hope and new life.

I have been reflecting on these verses from Isaiah 43.18-19 as I go into March, 'Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland.' Isaiah often spoke in pictures and poetry. He aimed to help people escape from the usual ways of thinking, and to imagine that things could – and would – be different in the future. When this passage was written God's people were living in exile, in Babylon, struggling to maintain their identity in a society which did not share their faith. God invited them through Isaiah's words to imagine a future which would be radically different from their present reality. Sometimes I struggle to perceive the new thing God is doing as I am so focused on the past, the losses I am experiencing and the tragedies going on around the world. I encourage you as we move into Spring to perceive the new thing God is doing or notice the new growth around you. We are in the season of Lent which many people throughout the world celebrate. The actual word *Lent* in English means 'lengthen' as the hours of daylight are getting longer again. As life prepares to burst out of our natural world - lent prepares our hearts for the new life that Jesus brings through his resurrection.

On Palm Sunday we will remember Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. God was doing a new thing, but the people of God did not perceive it. One day they praised him shouting, 'Hosanna!' and some days later they shouted 'Take Him Away! Crucify Him!' As we journey through Easter it is a time for us to remember together his death and resurrection, when God did a new thing and brought new life to the world. Beyond the pain of the cross lies the hope of the resurrection. Let us not forget the new things God did and is doing and the promise that he will make a way in the wilderness and make streams in the desert. As I close, I'm reminded of a lyric from a worship song by Don Moen, 'God will make a way where there seems to be no way'.

What is springing up around you? What new growth do you notice? What new thing is God doing? Where do you need God to make a new way in the wilderness or a new stream in the desert?

My prayer is that you will experience hope and new life as we journey into March. Yours in Christ,


